Criteria

Clinical governance and quality improvement to support blood management

Organisation-wide governance and quality improvement systems are used to ensure safe and high-quality care of patients' own blood, and to ensure that blood product requirements are met.

Prescribing and clinical use of blood and blood products

The clinical use of blood and blood products is appropriate, and strategies are used to reduce the risks associated with transfusion.

Managing the availability and safety of blood and blood products

Strategies are used to effectively manage the availability and safety of blood and blood products.



- Transfusion/blood management nurse
- Transfusion trainer
- Transfusion safety officer/quality officer
- Transfusion/blood management clinical nurse consultant
- PBM coordinator









TP role in Australia

Focus:

 Clinical practice align with state, national and international guidelines and standards

Activities include:

- Audit
- Policy and procedure development
- Education
- Haemovigilance
- Change management
- Waste minimisation
- PBM activities such as management of iron deficiency











Transfusion nurse role at Lifeblood





- Blood Management/Transfusion governance committee





- Risk management
- Policy

- Adverse events
- Monitoring utilisation/waste

Common challenges

- Resources
 - Human
 - Financial
- Staffing
- Time
- Recognition and raising the profile of the TP within the organisation
- Change management, facilitating change and changing culture
- Blood Management Committee representation and enabling attendance
- Competing priorities for staff









Other challenges - regional/rural

- Access to specialist transfusion medicine/haematologist
- Part-time medical staff-not located on site
- BMC usually integrated into other meetings
- Distance to:
 - access blood/blood product
 - reach support
 - access education programs
- TP part-time or combined into another role
- Infrequent transfusions-reduced familiarity







Other challenges – private

Where a position is funded:

- challenge to keep funding
- most will be part-time
- responsible for multiple sites and/or state-wide responsibilities

Executive have less control to enforce practice change


